Reading, Language, Writing, Speaking and Listening Expectations for Kindergarten

Learning new language skills is a hallmark of kindergarten. Your child will learn about the alphabet and its role in reading. Your child will practice rhyming, matching words with beginning sounds, and blending sounds into words. Practice with these types of activities is a powerful step toward learning to read and spell correctly. The size of your child's vocabulary is another key factor in his or her ability to read and comprehend books and stories. Your child also will begin to experiment with writing and will be encouraged to use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing letters to share information, ideas, and feelings.

Print Concepts

By the end of Kindergarten your student should be able to:

- ✓ Produce rhyming words
- ✓ Chop a word into its syllable parts

- ✓ Ask and answer questions about words they do not know in a story
- ✓ Tell the difference between a book, a poem, and other types of stories
- ✓ Name the author and illustrator of a story, and tell what they do
- ✓ Tell about the story by looking at the pictures
- ✓ Tell how characters in stories are the same and different
- ✓ Listen and tell about stories that are read together

- ✓ Understand and use question words (interrogatives) (e.g., who, what, where, when, why, how)
- ✓ Use the most frequently occurring prepositions (e.g., to, from, in, out, on, off, for, of, by, with).
- ✓ Finish a sentence that has already been started
- ✓ Put a capital letter at the beginning of a sentence and the pronoun "I"
- ✓ Recognize and name end punctuation
- ✓ Write a letter or letters for most consonant and short-vowel sounds (phonemes)
- ✓ Write the letter or letters that makes a sound
- ✓ Write the letters they hear in a word
- \checkmark Spell simple words phonetically, drawing on knowledge of sound-letter relationships

Vocabulary Acquisition and Use

- ✓ Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words and phrases based on kindergarten reading and content
- ✓ Identify new meaning for familiar words and apply them accurately (e.g., knowing duck is a bird and learning the verb to duck)
- ✓ Know that parts added to words can change the meaning (e.g., -ed, -s, un-, Pre-, ful, -less)
- ✓ Sort objects into groups with help
- ✓ Say the opposite of a word (antonyms)
- ✓ Match spoken words to places and things
- Use words heard before when talking about a story

Writing Expectations

Text Types and Purposes

By the end of Kindergarten your student should be able to:

- ✓ Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to compose opinion pieces
 - o Tell a reader the topic
 - Tell the name of the book they are writing about
 - o State an opinion or preference about the topic or book
- ✓ Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to compose informative/ explanatory texts in which they name what they are writing about and supply some information about the topic
- ✓ Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to narrate a single event or several loosely linked events
 - o Tell about the events in the order in which they occurred
 - o Tell how I felt about what happened

Production and Distribution of Writing

By the end of Kindergarten your student should be able to:

- Respond to questions and suggestions from peers and add details to strengthen writing as needed (with help)
- ✓ Use the computer and other digital tools to record and publish writings.
- ✓ Collaborate with peers

Research to Build and Present Knowledge

By the end of Kindergarten your student should be able to:

- ✓ Study, learn, write, and research with others
- ✓ Recall information from experiences/things I know about (with help)
- ✓ Find information from provided sources to answer a question (with help)
